

Lesson Plan

Framing and Sequencing Shots

Project Summary

Shots are framed for different reasons whether it is to show detail or to show surroundings. However, knowing how and when to compose a shot in a given way will allow your audience to understand the message behind your video. Students will be given a list of shots and record each using the rule of thirds, a stabilized camera approach, a background that is not distracting and, proper framing of the given shot.

Performance Objectives

PRE-PRODUCTION GOALS

1. Students will determine site location for each shot.
2. Students will storyboard each identified shot to demonstrate proper framing.
3. Students will determine the necessary equipment needed to record the given shots.
4. Students will determine the group roles for the project.

PRODUCTION GOALS

Students will interpret and record each given shot using the rule of thirds, a stabilized camera approach, a background that is not distracting and proper framing of the given shot.

POST-PRODUCTION GOALS

1. Students will review all shots and determine what shots meet the given criteria.
2. Students will label all shots.

Project Outline

Students will then begin a scavenger hunt to capture all shots using a tripod to stabilize your camera. Slate each shot. Record each shot to last at least 10 seconds.

Important: Shoot with a purpose. The camera operator should note when the recording counter begins and record a few seconds more than is needed.

LS of a building- Let your picture show the depth of the building. Use corners and foreground to give dimension and composition.

1. Over the shoulder shot of someone winking at another person. This shot is set-up to show the outline of the person being winked at. Use the rule of thirds to place your subjects
2. MS Pan of a person walking down a sidewalk. To properly capture this shot, you will need to allow the person to enter the screen, pan with the person steadily, and then allow the person to exit the screen
3. Low Angle MS of a person – This gives the feeling of a superior individual
4. High Angle MS of a person – This gives the feeling of an inferior individual
5. Use of foreground – Compose a shot that uses foreground to show depth in the picture
6. XCU of a person reading a book- As a person reads a book, compose a tight shot that cuts off the top of the forehead to just below the chin

7, 8 and 9 – Three shot sequence. Use three different shots to capture sequence, by using one establishing shot and two close-ups from different angles.
